Tribe Celebrates 43rd Federal Re-Recognition Anniversary

43 years ago on February 10, 1981, the United States Government officially re-recognized the Jamestown S'Klallam Tribe. To the Jamestown S'Klallam Tribe, this day serves as a reminder that S'Klallams have existed on the Olympic Peninsula since time immemorial and honors the current and past Tribal leaders and Citizens who have advocated and contributed to the Tribe gaining re-recognition. Federal re-recognition was no easy feat and this battle for recognition crossed multiple decades and generations. The Jamestown S'Klallam Tribe was the second tribe in the nation to be acknowledged with this status under the Bureau of Indian Affairs' 1978 Federal Acknowledgement Process.

Fast forward to February 10, 2024, Jamestown Tribal Citizens, Descendants, and their families gathered at the Dungeness River Nature Center to share a meal and stories about the importance of federal recognition and the history of the Tribe and, watch the "As Long as the River Runs" documentary about the struggle for Tribal treaty fishing rights and the Boldt Decision.

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February 12, 2024 is the 50th anniversary of the Boldt Decision, a significant court ruling affirm Tribal fishing and treaty rights.

Tribal Citizens spoke of the significance of federal recognition, reflected on the past 43 years, and shared stories of the importance of the Boldt Decision. Some of the speakers included: Chairman/CEO W. Ron Allen, (Allen Family), Councilwoman Dana Ward (Chubby Family), former Councilwoman/Tribal Elder Elaine Grinnell (Prince Family), Tribal Elder/Spiritual Leader, Pat Adams (Hall/Adams Family), Tribal Citizen/Traditional Foods Gathering Coordinator Mackenzie Grinnell (Prince Family).

Thank you all who attended the event, and we look forward to celebrating again next year.





New Library and Exhibit Space Opens!

In late 2018, Leanne Jenkins, former Planning Director, came into Heron Hall Library with a plan to move the north wall out an additional 20 feet or so. We were thrilled at the prospect of getting a bit more space! From that humble beginning (and nearly five years later), the dream blossomed from a building of less than 2,000 sf to over 5,000 sf that includes expanded shelving, a recording room/small conference room, 14-seat theater, and a dedicated exhibit space (not to mention two public restrooms!).

In 2019, we received a grant from the Institute for Museum and Library Services to create a museum-quality exhibit in our newly planned library. We met with Tribal Elders, Tribal Citizens, and staff to gather thoughts and suggestions on what the exhibit should contain. We hired a professional exhibit designer, Andrew Whiteman and he turned those early ideas into a beautiful reality.
