On April 27, 2024, four remarkable Tribal Citizens, familiar faces at many Tribal events, embarked on a journey to Lake Crescent. Their mission? To conquer the Klallam Language certification examination. Initially aiming for the basic level of teaching certification, they surpassed all expectations and emerged as advanced-level achievers! Let's meet these extraordinary individuals.

First, we have Tribal Elder Mary Norton (Reyes Family), who has taught alongside Timothy O'Connell III (Cook/Kardonsky Family) for the past few years. Mary remembers from the age of 12 when her Aunt Marion Lambert talked to her in Klallam and explained that if she could learn Spanish in school, she could learn Klallam. And now, in 2024, Mary is a certified Advanced Klallam Teacher! Mary and her siblings were the honorees at this year's Elders Honoring Lunch. See the gallery on page 5.

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# A Message From Our Chairman/CEO

## Derek Kilmer: A Tribal Champion in Washington, DC

Greetings Tribal Citizens!!! I write today to raise our hands to a true friend and champion for Tribal sovereignty, Treaty rights and our unique Indigenous culture and traditions.

Congressman Derek Kilmer has been serving as our Congressional representative in our District 6 since 2013 (11 years) following in the footsteps of Norm Dicks.

District 6 has 9 Tribes in it. Easily the district with the most Tribes in Washington State. As he became more tenured as a congressman and particularly as a member of the coveted Appropriations Committee, he became a 'go to' guy to help all Tribes. Over his career he regularly attends the National Congress of American Indians (NCAI) and the Affiliated Tribes of Northwest Indians (ATNI) conferences as well many other events to better understand the challenges and needs of Tribes across the country. Yet, he never took his eye of the Tribes in his district. And we thank him for making a difference.

Derek has always had a great interest Indian Country and I remember him when he was in the 6<sup>th</sup> grade and came down to interview me to find out what Tribal sovereignty meant to me and our Jamestown S'Klallam Tribe. Even as a young student, he had a keen interest in Tribes and Indigenous peoples in America.

On April 26<sup>th</sup>, Jamestown hosted a 'Thank you' tribute to Derek attended by countless Tribes in our district and many others who have appreciated his support for legislation that made a difference for them, as well as what he was able to secure for the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) and Indian Health Services (IHS) budgets that benefited Tribes across the country.

Over his congressional career, he quickly became a bridge builder crossing the political aisle to create bipartisan legislative initiatives. He met with the Republican right-wing members to understand their views and priorities and found ways to persuade them to join a common cause, and often with respect to Indian Country affairs.

A big civil rights advocate and had a proud moment to walk the Edmund Pettus Bridge that was famous as a part of the Civil Rights March on Washington with the late John Lewis a civil rights icon along with Martin Luther King, Jr. Before Derek became a congressman, he served in the State Legislature both as a representative and Senator. He was always a lead advocate for civil rights, education, health care, and natural resources, particularly fisheries and timber. His roots were deep in our interests and community values.

As many are aware, Derek is stepping down after this term ends in 2024 and we must look to a successor who has the same roots, commitment, and understanding of our Tribes' needs. I and our Tribe have endorsed Emily Randall from the Poulsbo area and currently a State Senator. Emily has a very similar community background as Derek, who grew up in Port Angeles.

Emily grew up in Kitsap County (District 6) and has been an activist and leader for our communities for the same fundamental values as Derek. She has been a leader for education, health care, family services, and strengthening our economy to create more jobs. She has been a strong supporter of our Tribal sovereignty and Treaty rights. She has a strong background and respect for our unique indigenous cultures and traditional practices and honors them. She is a proven leader in Olympia as she is the current Deputy Majority Leader. Senator Murray recognized her leadership as she also endorsed her.

As we raise our hands to thank Derek for doing so much for Indian Country and our unique needs on the Olympic Peninsula, we must now look to succession and with the same quality dedicated leaders to continue having representation in Congress that represents and advocates for our Tribal values and vision for our future.

We always look to leaders who understand that Nation-building is the mission of all Tribes, as we all seek to restore our governmental capacity to protect our sovereignty, jurisdiction, and treaty rights, while building our essential programs and services for our citizens. We are honored to raise our hands to a friend and champion and now look to the next generation who will become the next Washington, DC warrior for Indian Country and our community.

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## NOAA Delegates Visit Jamestown S'Klallam Tribe and Tour Dungeness River Restoration Sites

On March 7, 2024, Janet Coit, the Assistant Administrator of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), came to the Jamestown S'Klallam Tribe to go on a Dungeness River Restoration Tour. In the company also from NOAA Fisheries were Scott Trumsey, Deputy Regional Administrator, Sean McNally, Senior Advisor, and Lalena Amoittee, Tribal Relations Coordinator. Before the tour, Jamestown S'Klallam Natural Resources (NR) Department staff presented an overview of the locations and the reasoning behind the restoration work to the NOAA delegates. Restoration sites include Caldero, Dungeness River Nature Center (DRNC), Upper River's Edge, Lower River's Edge, and Three Crabs. JST staff who facilitated and joined the tour are Hansi Hals, NR Director; Randy Johnson, Habitat Program Manager; Powell Jones, previously DRNC Director, now Land Steward Manager; and Loni Greninger, Culture Department Director, and Vice-Chairwoman. Having these NOAA Delegates visit is a great honor and an opportunity to see first-hand the work being implemented by a Tribe and how important these federal funds are to rural communities.

# 2024 Elders Honoring Lunch: Norton Family

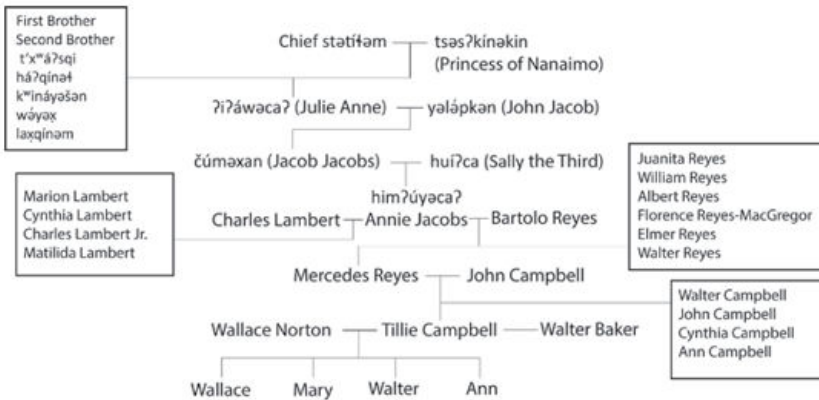

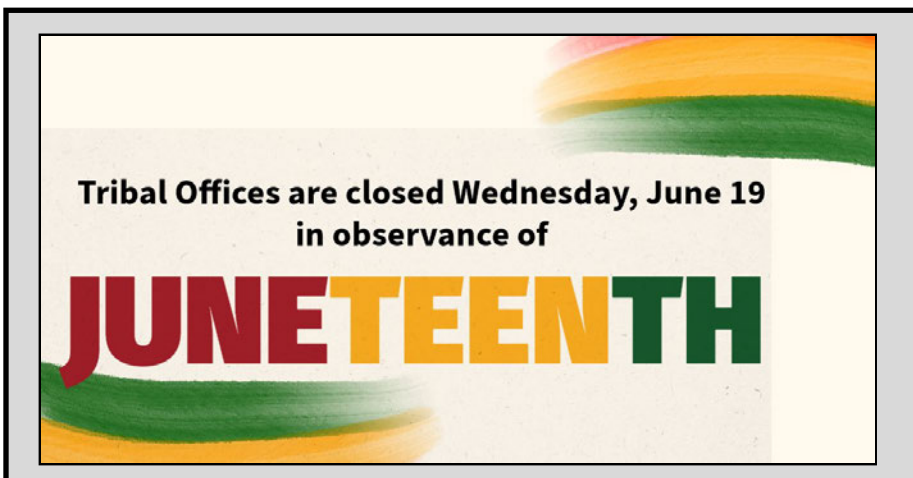

# Peninsula Behavioral Health Gala; Reducing Stigmas of Mental Health and Substance Use Disorders

One cannot increase a community's well-being without addressing creating resources for mental health and substance use disorders. Unfortunately, there are many stigmas and misconceptions about mental health and substance use disorders. Typically, external and environmental factors significantly impact or cause these conditions. Individuals have little control over these factors and can experience financial and resource barriers when seeking treatment. Everyone deserves to be able to seek and receive the treatment they need.

On Thursday, May 2, Peninsula Behavioral Health (PBH) hosted its annual gala, and Jamestown Family Health Clinic, Healing Clinic, and Jamestown S'Klallam Tribal staff attended this event. Dr. Paul Cunningham, the Chief Medical Officer of Jamestown Family Health Clinic, was an emcee for this night and presented on "Ensuring Access to Behavioral Health Care for Everyone," explaining the importance for the Olympic Peninsula to break

down these barriers for seeking treatment. The president of the board of directors for Peninsula Behavioral Health, Dave Arand, was the second emcee and presented on "Creating Connections, Beyond the Stigma" and discussed the need for empowering, judgment-free, and supportive treatment options within our community.

His mother, actress Patty Duke, revealed in her 1987 memoir "Call Me Anna" her bipolar diagnosis and spent years advocating for mental health awareness and reducing stigma. After she passed away in 2016, Sean followed in his mother's footsteps and became an advocate.

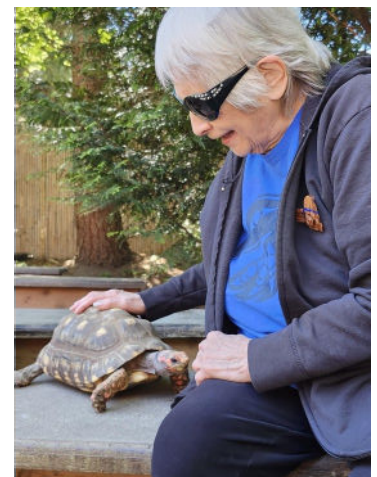

# Jamestown Family Health Clinic Implements Unique Medical Assistant Certification Bridge Program

At the doctor's/physician's appointment, medical assistants are commonly the first people you'll see in the room, and they explain the reasoning behind your need for the appointment.

"They're getting you ready for your visit. So, they take your vitals and get a quick history of why you're there. They assist the provider through the entire visit. They are a huge advocate for the patient," explained Elizabeth "Liz" Moseley, JFHC's Medical Assistant Supervisor.

Typically, physicians only have 5-10 minutes with patients and focus on diagnosis and treatment. So, usually, a patient has the most conversations with the Medical Assistant rather than the physician. It's up to the medical assistant to digest the patient's concerns and concisely deliver them to the physician before the physician meets with them. Medical assistants bridge the gap between the nurses and the providers, begin preparing for patients' appointments a week in advance, conduct charting medical records, and help perform procedures.

Jamestown Family Health Clinic recognizes how vital medical assistants are in healthcare and values these positions with the highest respect. Recently, to provide more educational opportunities and retain high-quality staff, JFHC has built and implemented the Registered Medical Assistant (RMA) to Certified Medical Assistant (CMA) Bridge Program. This type of program is available through hospitals and colleges. However, JFHC has a unique approach that reduces barriers and puts the Medical Assistant first.

While other workplaces have rigid stipulations and can cost more than \$1000, the JFHC RMA to CMA Bridge Program requires the RMA to have worked at the clinic for at least six months (720 hours as an RMA) and will pay for the online program and books, while providing a support system.

The difference between a registered and a certified medical assistant is that certified medical assistants have credentials accepted in every state and have a higher pay scale.

"Your scope of practice will always be limited [if you are a registered medical assistant rather than a certified]. You don't get the opportunities with patients you would otherwise get if you were certified," said Liz. "The pay scale is much different. When you're a registered medical assistant, your starting pay is \$18/hour versus a certified starts at \$22/hour."

JFHC has 25 medical assistants, two of whom have completed this program. Brandee Gallagher, a recent graduate of the program, recommends that registered medical assistants become certified.

"It's been a journey, but it will continue to be a journey for me because every day is a learning experience. Even though you think you can't do it, do it. It's worth it, and it's quite the accomplishment."

It was an honor to host and represent the Jamestown S’Klallam Tribe and Sequim’s community schools on March 28, 2024.

This gathering was the first-ever Spirit Program in Washington State. Sequim School District is the first to implement this program from the U.S. Department of Justice.



I got to head off with a presentation of the Jamestown S’Klallam Tribal history. Thank you to Thank you to Kim Kettel for recommending me to the school board and Loni Greninger for her assistance with putting my speech together.

We had 110 8th—and 9th-grade students at Red Cedar Hall to discuss and share positive aspects of their school and identify issues and concerns.

The students then presented these to the superintendent, principals, and teachers. It was two very intensive and active days. Sequim High School will follow up on the success of this program.

Topics included sanitary issues, bullying, drugs in schools, gender issues, proper use of pronouns, and the lack of funding for building repairs.

# Farmland Conservation Efforts of the Tribe and North Olympic Land Trust

Since 2021, the Tribe and its partner, North Olympic Land Trust (NOLT), have worked to preserve farmland within the Carlsborg area near the Dungeness River. This collaboration was borne from the Rivers Edge Levee Setback project, where the Tribe purchased 65 acres of farmland that had been floodplain forest along the river until approximately 1900. In 2022, the Tribe removed the federal levee separating this property from the river, and the land became part of the Dungeness River floodplain once again.

The Tribe values protecting farmland and specifically crafted our grant to include conserving at least 130 acres of farmland, twice the amount of land we returned to the river ecosystem. How are farmlands protected, you ask? The purchase of agricultural easements placed on the property limits/restricts development. Still, it allows the property owner to continue engaging in farm activities. In the Sequim area, agricultural easements cost about half of the land's total real estate value. If the land is sold, the agricultural easement remains on the property, restricting the property's use for agricultural activities. Agricultural easements permanently protect vital local farms that are under threat from urbanization. Easements reduce land use competition between urban and agricultural systems and mitigate the impacts of projected urban expansion.

In 2020, the American Farmland Trust (AFT) found that nationwide, between 2001 and 2016, developers converted roughly 4 million acres of farmland into highly developed urban land uses. In addition, AFT reported that low-density residential land use expanded rapidly and contributed to the loss or fragmentation of nearly 7 million acres of farmland over the same time period. In the Sequim area, farmland is currently worth approximately twice as much if it's developed for residential uses than if it remains farmland. This astounding difference in dollar value is the primary driver for the rampant conversion of farmland into residential property seen in the Sequim-Dungeness Valley since the 1960s. Nationwide, climate change and extreme weather push farmers to convert their fields, selling less-productive agricultural lands for urban development, particularly where retaining production would require more investments and management (e.g., water-saving irrigation techniques) to protect against future climate shocks.

In Clallam County, farms are a cornerstone of the community. By working together, the Tribe and NOLT have thus far conserved 112 acres of farmland. We could not do this alone because purchasing agricultural easements requires funds, willing landowners, and partnerships. The Tribe received a \$9 million Floodplain by Design grant from the Washington Department of Ecology in 2021. With the grant, the Tribe is reforesting approximately 50 acres of reconnected floodplain at Rivers Edge. We constructed the new bridge and outdoor classroom at the Nature Center, purchased three riparian properties, and provided NOLT funds to purchase agricultural easements. NOLT has expanded their partnership to include Clallam County Conservation futures, and Washington Recreation and Conservation Wildlife and Recreation Program.

**No Goat Farm is the most recent addition to a rich tapestry of over 800 acres of farmland and habitat protected in the Dungeness area over the last 34 years.**

The purpose of this meeting was to discuss and present on tribal data sovereignty, behavioral health, Indian Health Policy, and legislative affairs that directly affect the health care of tribal communities.

# Reminder: Community Volunteer Day at Garden

I hope this Spring has been treating you well so far! We've been busy out at the community garden building beds, preparing beds to plant into, seeding food and flowers, and constructing a deer fence so our furry friends are not persuaded to eat our delicious vegetables and fruit. It's been beautiful and heartwarming to see so many people from this community come out to our Harvest and Hang events every Wednesday. We hope you continue to join us throughout the Spring and Summer!

Although we have seeded and planted most of our first succession of crops for this year at the garden, there is still plenty of time to sow and grow the following foods before the end of July: green beans, beets, swiss chard dry beans, dill, basil, bell peppers, zucchini and summer squash, fennel, collard greens, parsley, potatoes, radishes, turnips, chives, cucumbers, carrots, and cauliflower.

There are easy and accessible ways to get these seeds started! While potting soil is recommended for starting seeds, feel free to use any available soil as long as it is not contaminated with any harmful materials (metals, plastics, chemicals). If you have any paper egg cartons, toilet paper rolls, or clear plastic clamshell containers. These are excellent materials for starting your seeds! Simply fill the containers with soil and follow the seed packets' planting instructions. 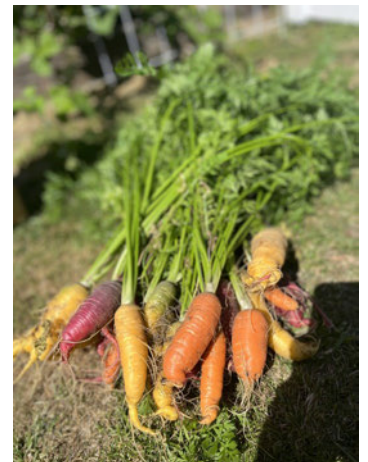

## 2024 Volunteer of the Year Nominations

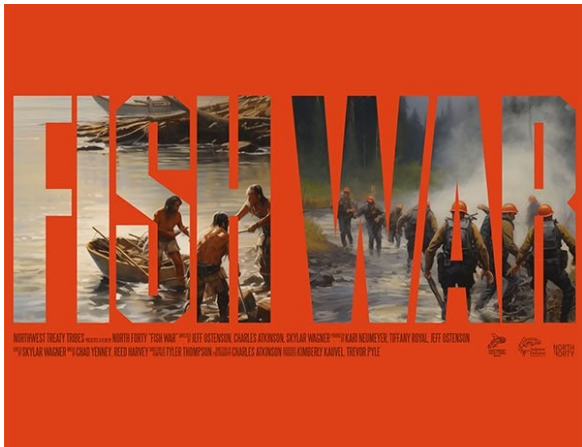

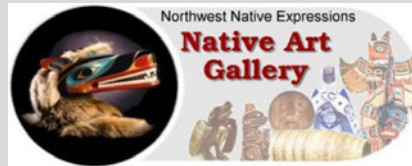
