From Our Chairman: Happy Holidays, family, friends and community!



2024 Tribal Election Certified

The results are in! With more than 220 votes cast in the November 5 Tribal Election, the Jamestown S'Klallam Tribe council is set. Richard "Rickv" Allen Johnson received 107 of the 226 ballots cast (47.3 percent) for the office of Treasurer. Josh Chapman received 62 votes (27.4 percent) and Latrisha Suggs received 57 votes (25.2 percent). Loni Grinnell-Greninger, running unopposed for Vice Chairperson, received 188 votes.

Drought and the Dungeness: Strategies to Support Fish Migration in Dry Times

On April 16, 2024, the Washington Dept. of Ecology declared a drought emergency across most of the state. The announcement was prompted by low winter snowpack and forecasts for a warm and dry summer. With the Dungeness-Elwha watershed at only 49% of normal by the end of April, it was a good thing drought planning meetings for the Dungeness began back in February.

JST Natural Resources has been an active player in proactive drought response; coordinating with Washington Water Trust, Dungeness Water Users Association, Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW), and the Washington Dept. of Ecology to discuss needs, funding, and schedule.

Multiple strategies were employed to ease the impacts of late season irrigation diversions that occur during the driest time of year while ESA-listed salmon are spawning. Dry-Year Leasing, a flow restoration program implemented in previous drought years, pays farmers to not divert water from the river for a 32-day period. This voluntary program managed 15 forbearance agreements this drought season and kept 9 CFS (cubic feet per second) of discharge in the Dungeness River.

Another flow restoration strategy, the Pulse Flow Program, paid irrigators to shut gates and halt diversions during four, 13-hour pulse flow events. The hope is that the increased flow during the pulse events will trigger fish holding

in the lower river due to low flows, to move upstream. The 2024 Pulse Flow Program temporarily returned an average of about 20 CFS per event back to the river.

In addition to the plans to keep water in the stream, there was also action taken in the river to address shallow riffles — physical barriers that impede fish migration. JST staff walked the river to identify barrier riffles and coordinated with WDFW on planning for instream action. Mitigations included installing inflatable aqua-dams and constructing rock dams to direct fish passage.

During three big days of work, JST, WDFW along with NOSC, and a WCC crew were able to greatly improve fish passage in more than 15 stretches of the river.

Tracking the Chinook

New this year is JST's Chinook Tracking Pilot Project, a program that help us understand fish behavior — particularly during the pulse flows. Twenty-four adult Chinook were captured and tagged, and 12 acoustic receivers were installed throughout the lower 12 miles of the Dungeness River to track fish movement via acoustic transmission, as well as collect water temperature at transmitter locations.

Staff observed that stream temperature and rain events seemed to have an impact on upstream migration. Results from year one were mostly inconclusive, but a lot was learned.

It may take several years of data to attribute flow benefit to migration and spawning, and in the meantime, staff will continue to improve logistics and expand the program.

Next year, additional receivers will be installed in the river to provide a better understanding of where and how long fish hold in the river while migrating.

WDFW's preliminary 2024 Chinook redd survey number is 617, with an adult return estimate of 1,295 Dungeness Chinook, well above the re-

covery goal of at least 935 adult escapement! Well-timed rain, cool temperatures, and the many drought response efforts were all likely part of how the fish were able to move.

Staying in the know

To keep the public informed and engaged on how they can assist in drought response efforts, JST provided assistance to WSU Extension to deliver outreach in the form of a webpage, press releases, radio spots, event booths, handouts and workshops.

By building upon existing partnerships and programs, and strengthening preparedness strategies, regional collaborators successfully worked together to reduce drought vulnerability and increase resilience.

Tribe Breaks Ground on Behavioral Health Facility

The Jamestown S'Klallam Tribe recently held a groundbreaking for a new 16-bed Psychiatric Evaluation and Treatment Center (E&T) in Sequim.

This facility will be constructed on the Jamestown Healing Campus and will provide essential mental health services to individuals in crisis within Clallam and Jefferson counties.

The new E&T will offer short-stay evaluation and treatment for those experiencing severe acute psychiatric symptoms. The facility will provide 24-hour support to stabilize symptoms and prepare individuals to return home or transition to other community-based programs.

"We are committed to addressing the behavioral health crisis in our community," said Brent Simcosky Director of Health Services for the Jamestown S'Klallam Tribe.

"This new facility will provide vital services and improve access to care for individuals in need. Our Tribe's vision is to create a healing space for our entire community. "By providing comprehensive mental health services, we aim to foster a synergistic environment where individuals can receive the support they need to heal and thrive. Together, we can build a stronger, more resilient community for all."

The E&T will be owned and operated by Jamestown S'Klallam Tribe and will serve individuals ages 18 and older. The facility will be a valuable addition to the Jamestown Healing Campus, which already offers a range of healthcare including wrap-around services for substance use disorders to serve the needs of our community.

The project is a collaborative flort between the Jamestown Tribe, Washington state, and support of our local healthcare leaders. Construction began this fall, with completion and operations anticipated in the first quarter of 2026.

He was active in sports, including Little League and district basketball teams in middle and high school. He was active in the Sequim Community Church's Youth Group. He loved playing bass guitar with his friends in the band 'The Irregulars'.

He attended Western Washington University and finished up his Bachelor's Degree in Business at the University of Washington in 2017. He returned to school at Washington State University, earning a Masters in Business Administration in 2019.

Joe worked in Jamestown S'Klallam Tribal enterprises beginning at the age of 12 at Jamestown Fireworks. He worked for 7 Cedars Casino for 12 years, rising to the level of Casino Operations Manager. He served for many years on the EDA Board of Directors, as well as the JKT Development/JEX, and Jamestown Capital Boards.

In August 2021, he was hired as the Executive Director of the Tribe's Economic Development Authority, where for 3 years he oversaw the expansion and addition of several new Tribal businesses. Joe was very proud of the accomplishments of the Tribe, both for its people and for the larger community. He fully appreciated the forward-thinking vision of Tribal Councils, its Economic Development Authority, 7 Cedars properties and Health Care Program.

Joe loved his parents, sister Amber and brother-in-law Ilan Jones, and especially being Uncle Joe to his nephews Faelan and Vidar

Jones. Family was important to Joe, and he loved his extended family, including aunts, uncles and cousins from both sides of his family. He enjoyed exploring his lineage on Ancestry.com, as well as travel to Asia, Europe, Central America and the South Pacific.

He was a kind, funny and generous man who loved his family and friends. Everyone remembers Joe's smile, laughter and great embracing spirit. He made friends wherever he encountered them, and recently said "My friends are my heart."

It's Holiday Mail Theft Season

As we approach the upcoming Holiday Season, I wanted to put out a reminder regarding mail theft and how to avoid being a victim this year. I have been in law enforcement for several years now in two different states, and every year this happens everywhere. The timeframe just after Thanksgiving until just after New Years results in a large upswing in mail theft.

We all know between those times people are mailing money, gifts and various packages, as well as receiving them. Criminals count on it and the level of mail theft skyrockets.

The longer hours of darkness don't help much either. Rural areas seem to get hit hard every year. Thieves following the mailman and delivery trucks has become common place.

I have listed a few ideas below to consider when trying to avoid becoming a victim this year:

• Consider that little red flag on the side of your mailbox, a flashing neon sign that reads "steal me."

• If you plan to put the flag up and send it from your mailbox, please don't put it out the night before.

• Most of us know roughly when the mail comes. Try and get the mail soon after that.

• If you send out cards with checks or money (even to pay bills), consider dropping them off at the locked postal drop sites at the post office.

• Many of us will order gifts via Amazon or other delivery services. If you are like me and work all day, that package will likely sit on your porch for several hours before you get home. Boxes and packages sitting in the open on your porch are another neon sign that reads —YEP, YOU GUESSED IT— "steal me".

• Consider a note to the vendor to leave those smaller packages behind an unlocked screen door or having a trusted neighbor who is retired or is home during the day grab them for you.

If you have family, neighbors, friends, etc., home during the day, have the packages shipped to their address instead.

If you notice any suspicious people or vehicles, please don't hesitate to notify law enforcement.

Your vigilance and quick reporting can make a significant difference.

A good description or license plate number is always helpful.
